As the number of our neighbors needing assistance continues to grow, creative efforts on the part of individuals, businesses, organizations and churches are helping us meet the increasing need. Here are just a few examples of how the Gig Harbor community is making a vital difference in the lives of our neighbors.

Fairway Mortgage challenged another company to collect food. As other businesses learned of the effort, they joined in and the food drive was named "Business 2 Business" or (B2B). This combined project generated 3,275 food items and \$110. The Canterwood ladies golf groups appealed to their community and donated \$9,225 plus 2,740 food items, backpacks and school supplies. Safeway shoppers contributed 16,945 food items and \$8,547 on the first Friday and Saturday of the month over the past year. Individuals regularly drop off food donations at the food bank and gardeners share their beautiful produce.

While this is a lot of food, *it is gone in a matter of days*, as we provide an average of 17,500 meals a month to families, elderly and disabled persons. Increasing rent, illness, injury and many other situations put neighbors in need of help.

Cash donations enable us to buy perishables and provide emergency aid to clients. Financial gifts also let us help qualified college and trade school students with funds for books, transportation and other expenses to improve their job opportunities.

As we plan for a much-needed new facility, **Swim With FISH** raised \$28,900, which will be matched. **Chapel Hill Presbyterian Church** has promised a \$100,000 matching grant over three years. **St. John's Episcopal Church** raised \$7,240 as a matching grant in one day. With support like this, FISH volunteers believe this community will continue to provide compassionate help long into the future.

Add to this, the thousands of volunteer hours that make everything work, and you have a community that really cares for our neighbors.

Here are two tax-savvy ways to donate

Along with helping our neighbors in need, some donors may be able to lower their income taxes through strategic giving. While many people no longer itemize their charitable gifts due to the significant 2018 increase in the standard deduction, there still are a few tax-advantaged ways to give. Ask your tax adviser about these options:

• Qualified charitable distributions (QCDs): Retirees over 70½ years who must take a required minimum distribution from their retirement account may be able to reduce their annual taxable income by having their IRA custodian write a check directly to an IRS-qualified non-profit such as GHP FISH. The check must be made out to the organization, and you'll still need a receipt.

• **Appreciated stock**: Donating appreciated stock has a couple of potential advantages. If you are itemizing your deductions, this qualifies just like a cash donation. For example, let's say you own 100 shares of a stock and paid \$10 a share, and now it's worth \$20 a share. You could donate \$2,000, get the deduction and only have paid for the initial investment of \$1,000.

GHP FISH can receive and acknowledge such gifts, but consult your qualified tax adviser or the IRS to be sure of the rules.
