Now that Spring is here, things are growing—they're not the same as just a few weeks ago. That is exactly how it is at GHP FISH Food Bank. Hoping we were about finished with the pandemic and the economic downturn, we now find that the number of neighbors needing assistance is growing faster than ever.

In March, 619 families with 1,447 members came to us needing food, financial assistance and clothing the highest number we have ever served.

Significant increases in local rents have caused more people to use the food bank. This is especially true for those on fixed incomes. Fortunately, the new building is making it possible to deal with the increased need. Thanks to our generous donors and incredible volunteers, we are able to help our neighbors.

Increased shopping, storage and refrigeration space has given our volunteers the tools to meet the surge in demand. The new building was designed to help us meet the unexpected, and it's working.

Bill realizes the importance of the social connections among volunteers as we have tripled our grocery space and expanded the warehouse to five times its previous size. He's especially proud of our volunteers' commitment to treating each client with dignity, respect and genuine care.

Together, he and Pam seek to support those volunteers any way they can.

At the end of the day, the high school sophomore helps pack up the hundreds of donated food items and helps unload them back at our Food Bank facility. "Having Phoenix is a tremendous help," says Amy Gartlan, food drive coordinator.

Phoenix appreciates gaining experience outside his comfort zone and talking with shoppers. donated food and other items. Financial Aid volunteers help neighbors who need assistance for rent, utilities and other necessities.

GHP FISH also has a boutique that provides donated clothing and household items to shoppers free of charge. Volunteers in this area catalog and display the items.

GHP FISH volunteers help with food drives and fund raisers throughout the community, and participate in events like the Maritime Gig Festival in June and the annual toy drive during the holidays. Others help with tecnnology, finance and other tasks behind the scenes.
